# Guantanamo Bay Prison

---

About 600 people were secretly picked up by US forces globally and imprisoned in Guantanamo Bay (controlled by the US Navy) without their governments being informed.

## Key Violations:

- No trial before any magistrate.
- Families, media, and UN representatives were denied access.
- Amnesty International reported severe torture, violating US and international laws.
- Prisoners were not released even after being declared not guilty.



# Saudi Arabia & Kosovo

---

## Citizens in Saudi Arabia

---

A hereditary king rules; citizens have no role in elections. The king selects the legislature, executive, and judiciary.

- No political parties or independent media allowed.
- No freedom of religion; public practice of non-Muslim faiths is banned.
- Severe public restrictions on women.

## Ethnic Massacre in Kosovo

---

A democratic election can still lead to tyranny without rights. Serb nationalist Milosevic won elections in Yugoslavia.

- His government was extremely hostile to the Albanian minority in Kosovo.
- Thousands of Albanians were massacred by their own country's army based on ethnic prejudice.

# Defining Rights

# Why Do We Need Rights?

---



## Democratic Sustenance

Democracy requires basic rights: right to vote, get elected, express opinions, and form political parties.



## Protect Minorities

Rights protect minorities from the oppression of the majority, ensuring the majority cannot do whatever it likes.



## Limit the Government

Elected governments can turn oppressive. Basic rights are placed higher than the government so they cannot be violated.

# Part 2: Rights in the Indian Constitution

---

Some rights fundamental to our life are given a special status.

They put the promises of the Preamble into effect.



## **Right to Equality**

The foundation of rule of law.



## **Right to Freedom**

Absence of constraints and interference.



## **Right against Exploitation**

Protection for the weaker sections.



## **Right to Freedom of Religion**

India's stance as a secular state.



## **Cultural and Educational Rights**

Protecting minority heritage.

# Right to Equality

The government shall not deny to any person in India equality before the law or the equal protection of the laws. This is the **Rule of Law**.

- No person is above the law (political leader, official, or citizen).
- No discrimination on grounds of religion, race, caste, sex, or place of birth.
- Equal access to all public places (shops, hotels, wells, roads).
- Equality of opportunity in matters of public employment.



# Equality vs. Special Treatment

## Are Reservations against Equality?

No. Equality does not mean giving everyone the exact same treatment regardless of need. It means equal opportunity.

Reservations for SCs, STs, and OBCs provide special treatment to ensure equal opportunity for historically disadvantaged groups.

Furthermore, the Constitution strictly forbids the practice of "untouchability" in any form, making it a punishable offence.

# Right to Freedom

---

Freedom means absence of interference in our affairs by others. All citizens have the right to:

- Freedom of speech and expression.
- Assemble in a peaceful manner.
- Form associations and unions.
- Move freely throughout the country.
- Reside in any part of the country.
- Practice any profession or trade.

*\*Reasonable restrictions apply: Freedoms cannot cause public nuisance, incite violence, or defame others.*



# Life & Personal Liberty

---

No person can be deprived of his life or personal liberty except according to procedure established by law. If arrested, specific procedures must be followed:



## Right to be Informed

The detained person must be informed of the reasons for their arrest and detention immediately.



## 24-Hour Rule

The arrested person shall be produced before the nearest magistrate within a period of 24 hours of arrest.



## Legal Defence

The person has the fundamental right to consult a lawyer or engage a lawyer for their defence.

# Right against Exploitation

---



## Human Trafficking

The Constitution prohibits 'traffic in human beings' — the selling and buying of humans, usually women, for immoral purposes.



## Forced Labour

Prohibits *begar* or forced labour, where a worker is forced to serve free or at nominal pay. Lifelong *begar* is bonded labour.



## Child Labour

Bans employing children below 14 years in factories, mines, or hazardous work (like railways, beedi making, firecrackers).

# Freedom of Religion

---

India is a **Secular State**. It does not establish any official religion and maintains equal distance from all religions.

- Every person has the right to profess, practice, and propagate their religion.
- No forced conversions (by force, fraud, or allurement).
- Religious practices degrading women or involving human/animal sacrifice are banned.
- No religious instruction in government-run educational institutions.



# Cultural & Educational Rights

---

Democracy gives power to the majority. To prevent minorities from being neglected, the Constitution provides special protections:

## Conserving Culture

---

Any section of citizens with a distinct language or culture has the fundamental right to conserve it.

Admission to any government or government-aided educational institution cannot be denied on grounds of religion or language.

## Minority Institutions

---

All minorities have the right to establish and administer educational institutions of their choice.

Note: Minority status is state-specific based on language/religion (e.g., Telugu speakers are a majority in AP, but a minority in Karnataka).



# Part 3: Remedies and Expansion

---

Rights are useless if they cannot be enforced. We will explore how these guarantees are protected and how their scope is growing.

# Constitutional Remedies

---

Dr. Ambedkar called the Right to Constitutional Remedies the "**heart and soul**" of our Constitution. It makes all other rights effective.

- If a Fundamental Right is violated, citizens can directly approach the Supreme Court or High Courts.
- Courts can issue directions, orders, or writs to enforce rights and award compensation.
- **PIL (Public Interest Litigation)**: Any person can go to court against rights violations if it is in the public interest.



# National Human Rights Commission

---



## Independent Watchdog

The NHRC (set up in 1993) is an independent commission appointed by the President. It helps victims secure their human rights without the burden of court cases.

- It cannot punish the guilty directly (courts do that), but it makes independent inquiries into violations.
- Has wide powers: summon witnesses, demand official papers, inspect prisons.
- Any citizen can write a letter to the NHRC in New Delhi without fee or formal procedure.

# Expanding Scope of Rights

---

Rights are not limited to the original Fundamental Rights. Judicial interpretations and new laws constantly expand our protections.

## Right to Information

Enacted under the freedom of thought and expression, allowing citizens to seek govt info.

## Right to Education

Evolved from Fundamental Rights. Govts must provide free, compulsory education up to age 14.

## Right to Food/Life

Supreme Court expanded "right to life" to include food. Global treaties push for health and housing rights.
